The travel expenses listed in the project budget cover the cost of travel for the project’s consultants, Strive Network, and travel costs of the project manager. The Strive Network, based in Cincinnati, will plan to travel to Mahoning County for ten site visits with the Mahoning County Educational Service Center, Eastern Ohio P-16 Partnership for Education and their partners over the course of their contract. The travel expense for each visit is \$721.80. The travel cost for each visit includes mileage, hotel and food. Based on the cost of one trip, the total cost is \$7,218. The project manager’s travel costs (\$1,500) cover mileage, hotel and food for travel to related conferences and meetings during the project. The combined cost of the consultants travel and travel of the project manager total \$8,718.

Project Name: Shared Regional Education Data Management System for Eastern Ohio P-16 Partnership for Education

During the project, her work will be paid from by Local Government Innovation Fund dollars. Stephanie will be responsible for coordinating the 54 collaborating partners, meeting organization, development of meeting materials and agendas, meeting follow-up and general project management responsibilities. Based on Stephanie's salary and the number of hours required for the project, Stephanie's administration costs are \$16,889.40. During her work on this project, Stephanie will also be responsible for organizing, managing and participating in each of Strive's ten site visits. For each visit, Stephanie will be responsible for communicating with Strive and the 54 collaborative partners. She will also be responsible for organizing each visit and responsible for all the meeting details and logistics. The cost of preparing and organizing each site visit is \$1,264.96 or a total of \$12,649.60 for all ten visits.

Final Work Product:

The final work product expected from Strive Networks consulting work is a 180-day action plan for launching a regional, shared data system and an increase in the Partnership's ability to target specific leaks in the education pipeline and address critical educational gaps and needs of the children in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning and Trumbull counties. The detailed action plan will include key action items, responsible parties and timelines for deliverables. The Strive Network will also continue to support the work of Mahoning County ESC and Eastern Ohio P-16 Partnership for Education's initial implementation of the work. Please note, per the program policies of the Local Government Innovation Fund, implementation work will not be funded with LGIF dollars.

4. **Issue for Response: Program Budget**

The program budget requires attention. Please address the following issues(s): please provide additional explanation for the large changes in the program budget experienced between FY 2012 and FY 2013 and beyond, specifically the decreases in salary and benefits and the revenue sources changing significantly.

The large changes in the program budget experienced between FY12 and FY13 demonstrates the potential cost savings created by the development of a shared, regional data system instead of four county Education Service Centers and the Eastern Ohio P-16 Partnership for Education creating individual data systems. An amended program budget that demonstrates the costs of a four county Educational Service Centers and the Eastern Ohio P-16 Partnership of Education each creating a data system like the regional, shared data system proposed in the project can be found in Appendix A.

Program budget costs were determined by calculating the cost of one data system and multiplying the cost of one program by five (the number of individual data systems that would need to be created if Eastern Ohio P-16's data system is not funded). To calculate the cost of one program, information on current expenses were identified based on similar data systems located in other P-16 initiatives in Ohio. Based on the numbers provided by other Ohio P-16s, a budget for \$86,500 was developed.

The Eastern Ohio P-16 Partnership for Education was created to foster significantly better outcomes for students at each educational level in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning and Trumbull counties. The Partnership established a cross-sector partnership of 58 organizations in four counties to work collaboratively to provide support for students to reduce the need for remediation and to increase the number of high school students who graduate college and are career ready. 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
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The College of STEM at Youngstown State University sees the P-16 grant application as dove-tailing with and supporting several middle school and high school initiatives and outreach efforts of the College, especially through improved assessment metrics and regional collaboration. College efforts that would potentially benefit from the P-16 grant include the following:

- (1) Choose Ohio First Scholarship Program. This highly innovative program includes several components, including the Summer Algebra II-to-PreCalculus/Calculus Bridge Program. A month long, on campus, mathematics bootcamp program, it targets students from urban, high poverty, Youngstown-Warren area high schools. Bridge students who as seniors place at the appropriate mathematics level for their intended College major are given Choose Ohio First scholarships of up to \$5,200 per academic year. The College wants to dramatically expand participation in the Bridge Program. Scholarship awardees benefit from a suite of on campus enrichment activities, including exposure to academic and industrial leaders, access to the best professional practice opportunities, private tutors, and participation in research project teams whose research is professionally reviewed and sometimes results in peer-reviewed publications.
- (2) STEM Leadership Society. This highly selective program of the College brings together some of the best incoming STEM freshmen to form a live-and-learn community in the Honors dorm, with special access to College scholarship activities, professional practice opportunities, and community and technology and academic leaders.
- (3) Lake-to-River District Science Day. This annual, Ohio Academy of Science sanctioned event, organized by the College, draws in 5th-12th graders from Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning and Trumbull counties to present their project-based research in rigorously judged event for prizes and cash awards. District winner are eligible for State Science Day and millions of dollars in prizes, scholarships, and cash awards. The College, underwritten by grants from Dominion Gas and General Motors, has embarked on an ambitious program of improving middle school student participation from the Mahoning Valley, with special emphasis on teacher training.
- (4) STEM Explore. This new initiative of the College just completed its first year. It comprises a two-week, on campus Summer program that targets middle school students from the Mahoning Valley and integrates project and inquiry based activities, field trips, and field trips. A program goal is exposing students to STEM disciplines and career opportunities.
- (5) STEM Bridge. This is a week long, live on campus, bridge program for incoming STEM freshmen from urban environments with special emphasis on underrepresented minorities. Students learn about STEM disciplines, what will be expected of them to be successful at the college level, and where and how to get help if there are problems. This is a joint effort of the Center for Student Progress and the College of STEM.
- (6) College in High School. This program, headed by the Metro College division, has heavy participation by the College, with courses in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, and Physics currently offered in high schools throughout the Mahoning Valley.
- (7) Education for Service (NEOMED-YSU). A broad collaboration of Northeastern Ohio Medical University, YSU, the Youngstown Foundation, and other community leaders, this initiative is in formation and seeks to improve STEM education from middle through high school and to promote the health care professions in the process.

These and other efforts of the College would benefit from the P-16 grant. We look forward to working with Eastern Ohio P-16 and hope that LGIF, by supporting this grant application, will be a part of our continued success.
